

COMMISSIONER FOR OATHS (CFO)

Are there minimum criteria to apply to become a Commissioner for Oaths?

Yes, you must:

- Be at least 18 years of age.
- No criminal record.
- Be a Canadian citizen, landed immigrant, permanent resident.
- Have an employment or volunteer position that requires you to take oaths, affirm affidavits or witness statutory declarations.

What type of documents can a Commissioner for Oaths witness?

A Commissioner for Oaths can take an oath or affirmation from a person who is signing an affidavit or statutory declaration that is staying within Manitoba.

Note: Before agreeing to take an oath, affirmation or statutory declaration, ensure you understand the type of document and your authority under [The Manitoba Evidence Act](#) applies.

Where do I find a Commissioner for Oaths to take my oath, affirmation or statutory declaration?

Organizations may provide Commissioner for Oaths services for their existing clients such as financial institutions, insurance agencies, accountants, MLA or MP constituency offices, etc. Please connect directly with them to confirm.

How do I take an oath, affirmation or statutory declaration?

Once a Commissioner for Oaths is appointed, they may refer to the document called ***Taking Oaths, Affirmations and Statutory Declarations*** available on our [website](#).

Is a stamp required?

No. If you choose, you may purchase a stamp. Be advised that Commissioner for Oaths cannot use a seal.

Are there different types of Commissioner for Oaths appointments?

Yes

INSIDE - For witnessing Manitoba documents in Manitoba

OUTSIDE - For witnessing Manitoba documents outside of Manitoba, returning therein

Will I receive a renewal notice when a Commissioner for Oaths expires?

No.

How do I renew?

Submit an ***Application/Renewal*** form before your expiry date. Allow 2-3 weeks for processing Available on our [website](#).

My name, address or employer has changed, how do I update it?

Can a Commissioner for Oaths notarize, certify or verify documents leaving Manitoba?

No, only a Notary Public can notarize, certify or verify documents leaving Manitoba
